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- **The G20 and Global Governance**

Experts like Raghuram Rajan (2010) and Joseph Stiglitz (2015) argue that the G20's ability to shape global governance depends on its ability to bridge the interests of developed and developing nations. The analysis will identify key trends, commitments, and the evolution of sustainability discourse in G20 declarations over time.

The key Commitments in G20 Declarations:

The G20 has consistently addressed climate change, with a notable emphasis on achieving net-zero emissions. The 2023 declaration included one earth- one family- one future, commitments to inclusive growth, focusing on jobs, gender equality with specific commitments to equitable economic growth, access to education, and gender parity in the workforce. The 2021 G20 Rome Summit highlighted commitments to limiting global warming to 1.5°C above pre-industrial levels, stressing the importance of reducing greenhouse gas emissions and accelerating the energy transition. The 2022 declaration included a significant focus on biodiversity and nature-based solutions, emphasizing the protection of ecosystems as a key component of sustainable development.

The G20 has underscored the importance of building resilient and sustainable economies, particularly in the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic. The 2020 G20 Riyadh Summit called for a "green recovery," focusing on job creation in renewable energy sectors, clean infrastructure, and digital innovation. The 2023 G20 New Delhi Declaration emphasized the need for addressing income inequality, with specific commitments to equitable economic growth, access to education, and gender parity in the workforce.

- **Social Development and Poverty Alleviation**

The G20 declarations have consistently addressed social issues, particularly poverty alleviation, and improving global healthcare systems. The 2015 G20 Antalya Summit endorsed a framework for the reduction of poverty and inequality, particularly in Sub-Saharan Africa and least developed countries (LDCs). The commitment to achieving SDG 2 (Zero Hunger) and SDG 4 (Quality Education) was prominent in the 2021 and 2022 declarations, with commitments to expand food security and improve global access to education.
